other	The school has subscribed to the OPAL, Outdoor Play and Learning, initiative. This

provides structured and varied play opportunities during the lunch hour and has led to a great increase in participation in active games and play throughout the school lunch hour. An aim of this subscription is to develop positive and co-operative play over a period of years, providing the children at Brookfield school with experience of a range of outdoor play-based experiences, and an experience of dinner break which will be positive, inclusive and encourage a range of physical activities, whatever the weather. Children in Year 6 were trained as mini leaders (Bolsover District Council coaches and Shirebrook Academy) in order to lead games activities with other children. This peer-to-peer activity resulted in greater engagement with Key Stage 1 children and a sense of responsibility instilled in the Year 6 Mini Leaders.

Other How has your school's spending improved Children see the link between play and PE attainment? sport; they become increasingly independent in choosing physical activities during their breaktimes and with increased physical activities their balance, gross motor skills and physical fitness increases. Confidence is increasing and the amount of time children are active at lunch breaks has increased. The visit from a climbing wall provided children with a different sporting experience, in which they could challenge themselves. It provided an opportunity for all children to participate equally in a sporting event and to push themselves to improve their own performance. The variety of activities provided through OPAL play, the Pleasley Vale trips and after school multi-sports clubs has contributed to increased PE attainment, including targeting disadvantaged children. How has your school's spending increased Children have exposure to a broader range school sport participation? of activities and sports during break times and lessons. This provides children with a wider understanding of aspects of sport that are not a regular part of the curriculum; children have the opportunity to explore a range of sports.

How has your school's spending increased pupil participation in extra-curricular activities?

This exposure to a broader range of sports enables children to try a wide variety; this allows children to discover sports that they enjoy; the sports coaches brought in are often local and children have the opportunity to also then participate in these activities outside school. The school is currently further developing participation in sports festivals and external sporting events, made possible through the links with Bolsover District Council sports coaches and Shirebrook Academy coaches: for example, the school's Colour Run event and participation in QuadKids events.

Section 6 of 9 – sustainability

How is your school going to ensure that the improvements made through its spending of the PE and sport premium are sustainable?

By becoming an OPAL (Outside Plan and Learning) school, the children have an increased awareness of the importance of physical play and co-operation. The OPAL programme builds in levels, year upon year, to introduce varied physical activities and provide an increasing challenge to children, as part of a planned programme.

Our trips to Pleasley Vale Outdoor Activity Centre increase the children's confidence and provide a structured programme over a number of years, providing outdoor physical activities that would be impossible to provide on the school site.
